
Around 25,000 people from 59 Indigenous communities, School Districts and other local organizations were reached across 36 cities in BC in 2020.

Indigenous Friendship Centre, Dease Lake

Good afternoon, I am writing from the pregnancy outreach in Dease Lake in total appreciation for the food hampers and the diapers that were distributed with 18 families from Dease Lake, the cost of living in this isolated town is extremely high so the families were very grateful for such a generous donation, thank you very much from the pregnancy outreach in Dease Lake on behalf of many grateful families that you managed to lighten to cost of living in these wonderful hampers.



Indigenous community, Bella Bella

The donation is supporting our program called Granny's Kitchen, which currently supports 167 local households with weekly deliveries of fresh groceries and maintains a food bank of nonperishable foods and toiletries that those families can also drop by to access items as needed. The report reflects the average number of families who come to us in a month to pick up nonperishables. We conducted a survey of participants recently and I'll pass on some of the anecdotal responses that give you a sense of the program's impact: "I used to feel bad about not having enough food around the house for my kids. Now that pressure is gone because I know I can give them fresh fruit and healthy snacks and they're never going to school hungry." "It changes our family's life when we don't have to worry about food." "I'm a single mom of three girls and sometimes it feels hard to stretch my income to make sure they're taken care of. Our whole family is thankful for what this program does for us and so many other families in Bella Bella!"



Options Community Services, Surrey

Thank you so much for putting together the food hampers. This donation is such an impactful resource for our youth and families that we serve. We have been able to provide food hampers to youth that are just moving into their new place and had no food, and to youth and families that are low on income due to COVID, this has helped by providing them with meals and snacks. Our clients are so appreciative of the donation and have expressed their gratitude upon receiving it. Thank you kindly for keeping our program in mind and reaching out to us to receive this donation.



Surrey Urban Mission Society, Surrey

We make roughly 15,000 meals a month which is 3750 meals a week and 535 meals a day. The food donations we get from the Youth Leadership Society of BC help us achieve these figures. We currently have 200 that stay in our 4 shelters and we serve roughly 100 people off the street each day. The food donations help us provide nutritional meals to those in need. We are able to make hot meals for those living our shelters and bagged meals for those living on the street.



Black Women Community - Sisters Leading Sisters

It was so important to expand this program to the Black community during Covid and moving forward is because the Black community is often forgotten in BC because of the small numbers. Black & Indigenous people were impacted in higher numbers and exposed other inconsistencies and barriers in the workplace, health and education systems as a result of Covid. Women were the most impacted by job loss during the pandemic and will be moving forward and yet Black and Indigenous women are the fastest growing demographic of entrepreneurs in North America but aren't able to measure the amount of funding received by federal or Venture capital investors because it's so negligible at about .0002 % and therefore they are left "bootstrapping" it to make their businesses a success. These women are often adult students (furthering their education) and mothers and even elder caregivers as well.

The **Black women** in the community that I serve were incredibly grateful to benefit from this program. (I have some testimonials if you would like, let me know) Although small in numbers, some relief was had due to the program.

Black Community, Vancouver

I just wanted to let you know that the donations helped the mothers in the black community in general by providing them help during this pandemic but also in other ways. One mother at the beginning said to give the donation to another person in more need...more deserving. After talking to her, she told me that she is recovering from a major surgery and is paying thousands of dollars out of pocket for her medication. She started crying as she humbly accepted the help. This just showed me that there are mothers in all communities that are just making it work and that there is more to help and to help in other ways. I think that this type of program is vital in our community as a way to open the lines of communication, to build trust to identify the real problems and truly provide meaningful support to the community at large. I would like to work closer with you and YLSBC to have access or create these types of programs.

Sasamans Society, Campbell River

In October 2020 Lori Bull (ED at Sasamans Society) and this AYON had the opportunity to connect with Ravi Safaya from YLSBC. Ravi's ability to connect us to Emergency Food funding has allowed us to provide food security to over 15 youth and young adults in the Campbell River region. With this funding we have been able to partner with Foundry's current meal kit program. This meal kit program provides low-cost meal kits that include all the supplies to learn and prepare the meals in their own home. This AYON currently has 10 youth receiving weekly meal kits. The families and youth who are connected to the meal kit program often share photos of their delicious home cooked meals. They also share how much they are learning and enjoying trying different foods. The ability to teach youth who to prepare new food, while also giving them all the supplies really meet the needs of our community.
